In this master-class/workshop, participants will discuss what makes a good reading and explore the wide range of successful reading styles. Volunteers will then choose one of their own poems or a passage of prose to read aloud as if they were giving a public presentation, then get feedback from the group under the guidance of the instructor (an experienced actor, director, and radio commentator as well as an award-winning poet and Pulitzer Prize-winning critic). In an unthreatening and helpful atmosphere, the readers "work through" to a livelier, more effective presentation as they deepen their understanding of their own work.

A former sign painter, his work is still visible in the North Shore, including such clients as the Hawthorne Hotel, the Salem Witch Museum, and area churches. As a member of the U.S. Army, Ray witnessed first-hand the atomic bomb tests in Nevada in the 1950s, assigned to record the event in drawings now in the national archive; he has written poems about the experience also. Description: Sometimes a poem calls for a different voice—one that's not your own. Writing using a persona can free you to write about difficult subjects or experiences. It can help a poet avoid sentimentality or self-indulgence. It allows more control over the distance between poet and audience, and can give an audience room to breathe. A persona releases you from the constraints of time and space—you can speak as a Civil War nurse, a Neanderthal, or Queen Nefertiti. You can be a space alien or your goldfish. A persona can give you a more immediate kind of authority with being preachy. Or it can just be fun. But how does a poet create an authentic voice, one true in tone, diction and knowledge? In this workshop we will examine personae and how poets successfully create them. We will look at the work of a small, but diverse group of poets. Then we will put on the mask, and write a persona poem of our own. For whom will you speak? How will you answer the call of your poem?

Event Name: Reveling in Uncertainty: Embodying Negative Capability

Description: The influence of John Keats on Emily Dickinson is well remarked on. One of the more interesting influences is through the concept of negative capability, which he identified as "...when a man is capable of being in uncertainties, mysteries, doubts, without any irritable reaching after fact and reason." A complex, slippery concept, negative capability opens up creative thinking in a productive way for writers of all levels, whether by helping writers to trust the mysterious in their writing, to find surprising connections, or to live comfortably in the "gray" areas of life.

This workshop will navigate the concept of negative capability by looking at examples from Keats, Blake, Dickinson, Nick Cave, GennaRose Nethercott, Diana Koi Ngyuen, Tracy Smith, Jane Hirshfield, and others. Workshop leaders will provide writing prompts designed to enable participants to explore negative capability in their own work and lives, exercises to help cultivate it, and the opportunity to write an early draft of a poem that embodies the concept.

Both Joyce and Beverly have integrated negative capability into their own writing as well as into their teaching. Although the concept is complex, it provides a fruitful approach to any artistic endeavor and way of life, aiding writers in allowing for other possibilities. As practitioners of mindfulness and meditation, both facilitators are experienced in guiding students to be open to noticing, letting go of expectations, gathering in all ideas before judging them, and trusting that writing impasses may be resolved by resisting a forced or fixed solution.

Such is the way with a Hermit Crab Poem, an inventive structured writing that Brenda Miller's book, Tell it Slant, introduced to many people. Sometimes, in order to tell a difficult or vulnerable story, a unique "form" or structure must be found to contain the specific content.

In this participatory workshop, attendees and facilitators will together create a series of possible found forms for the poem they'd like to write, such as a field guide, a course syllabus, a marriage certificate or a resume. Hermit crab writing examples will be shared. A focus on consciously combining specific form and content will allow participants a deeper connection to the themes they choose to explore. Participants will be provided with sample hermit crab poems for guidance, time to write, and an opportunity to share their new poem and discuss their writing experience.

Both workshop facilitators have written and taught the Hermit Crab form. It is one of the most exciting structures to teach, because writers are often new to the process and very engaged and enthused to practice found forms!

She directs the Blacksmith House Poetry Series in Cambridge, MA.

January Gill O'Neil is an associate professor at Salem State University, and the author of Glitter Road (forthcoming, 2024), Rewilding (2018), Misery Islands (2014), and Underlife (2009), all published by CavanKerry Press. From 2012-2018, she served as the executive director of the Massachusetts Poetry Festival, and currently serves as the 2022-2023 board chair of the Association of Writers and Writing Programs (AWP). Her poems and articles have appeared in The New York Times Magazine, the Academy of American Poets' Poem-A-Day series, American Poetry Review, Poetry, and Sierra magazine, among others. Her poem, "At the Rededication of the Emmett Till Memorial," was a co-winner of the 2022 Allen Ginsberg Poetry award from the Poetry Center at Passaic County Community College. The recipient of fellowships from the Massachusetts Cultural Council, Cave Canem, and the Barbara Deming Memorial Fund, O'Neil was the 2019-2020 John and Renée Grisham Writer-in-Residence at the University of Mississispi, Oxford. She lives with her two children in Beverly, Massachusetts.

Description: In this interactive panel, five poets whose projects have engaged with—and challenged—representations of women as one-dimensional archetypes (sinner, saint, virgin, mother, witch) that appear in many historical, religious, and literary texts will share their poetry and brief comments on their creative process; ample time will be allotted for questions and discussion with the audience. Therese Gleason, a descendant of a judge at Salem and the 11th great-granddaughter of Alice Lake, who was executed for witchcraft on Boston Common c. 1650, will read from her chapbook, Matrilineal, which includes poems about her ancestor, Eve, Mary Magdalene, and St. Teresa of Ávila. Mandy Gutmann-González will share selections from their project, Salem Songs, which mines the 17th-century legal archive of the Salem trials, considering the court examination as poetic form, a hybrid of legal language and lyric utterance. Carolyn Oliver will read selections from an ongoing series of Eve persona poems (some of which appear in her chapbook Mirror Factory and her collection Inside the Storm I Want to Touch the Tremble) that explore violence, maternity, queerness, witchcraft, and sexuality—with a particular focus on the dialogue form. Cindy Veach will share selected works from her collection, Her Kind, an exploration of the Salem Witch Trials which braids archival accounts of the accused women displaying courage and integrity with contemporary examples of women resisting the traps of victimhood in a modern culture that often still remains inhospitable, if not hostile. Elizabeth Sylvia will read from her collection, None But Witches, in which she celebrates the intelligence and sharp

wit with which Shakespeare's female characters wield language as a means to speak truth to power in a

2016), finalist for a LAMBDA Literary Award. His work has been featured in The New Yorker, The Los Angeles Review of Books, and elsewhere, and he has received fellowships from Cave Canem, The Watering Hole, and the Lannan Foundation.

Also a scholar of trans theory and expressive culture in the U.S., Cameron earned his PhD from Stanford University's program in Modern Thought & Literature. His more critical writing can be found in Signs, Trans Studies Quarterly, American Quarterly, and elsewhere, and has been supported by fellowships from Duke University and the American Council of Learned Societies.

Asked in an interview if books can influence social change, Awkward-Rich responded: "I actually think it's quite weird to imagine that social change can happen without literature, since books of various kinds (and I'm counting oral traditions as "books" here) tend to be where ideas are stored and transmitted, where each generation learns all over again what the world is like, and has been like, and might be. How do you have collective action without collective imagination?"

Awkward-Rich was Postdoctoral Fellow in the Transgender Studies & Humanities Project with the Program in Gender, Sexuality, and Feminist Studies at Duke University. Presently, he is an assistant professor of Women, Gender, Sexuality Studies at the University of Massachusetts Amherst.

Franny Choi is a queer, Korean American writer of poems, essays, and more. Her most recent book is The World Keeps Ending, and the World Goes On (HarperCollins, 2022), an NPR 2022 Books We Love and Goodreads Readers Choice Award Semifinalist. Her other books are Soft Science (Alice James Books, 2019), a Rumpus and Paris Review staff pick that Lit Hub praised as "a profoundly intelligent work which makes you feel." It was a Nylon Best Book of 2019, was awarded the Elgin Award from the Science Fiction Poetry Association in 2020, and was a finalist for awards from Lambda Literary, Publishing Triangle, and the Massachusetts Center for the Book. Choi is also the author of the chapbook Death By Sex Machine (Sibling Rivalry Press, 2017) and the debut collection Floating, Brilliant, Gone (Write Bloody Publishing, 2019). She was a 2019 Ruth Lilly and Dorothy

Sargent Rosenberg Fellow and has also received awards from the Rhode Island State Council on the Arts and Princeton University's Lewis Center. Her poems have appeared in The New York Times, The Atlantic, Paris Review, American Poetry Review, and elsewhere. She co-hosts the poetry podcast VS with Danez Smith.

A Kundiman Fellow and graduate of the VONA Workshop, she founded the Brew & Forge Book Fair, a fundraising project that brings together readers and writers to build capacity in social justice community organizations. In 2019, she launched the Brew & Forge Lecture Series at Williams College, which puts poets and organizers in conversation with each other to discuss the intersections of activism and literary arts. As a curator, she has worked with organizations including Split This Rock and the Smithsonian Asian Pacific American Center, and she is particularly passionate about highlighting the voices of queer and trans poets of Asian/Pacific diasporas.

In an interview with The Paris Review, she was asked about how she uses form in her work: "I think when we play with form what we're engaging with is the technology of the poem. And so when I play with form, what I'm doing is saying that I'm a coauthor of this text along with the machine of poetry—the mechanics of the lyric—in order to produce this thing. The mechanics of the poem and I are collaborating in order to make something new with language that didn't belong to either of us to begin with. I'm still in the process of figuring out what a cyborg poetics is, but that feels like a clue to me." A seasoned performer, Choi is a two-time winner of the Rustbelt Poetry Slam and has performed her work in schools, conferences, theaters, and bars across the country. As a teaching artist, she has taught students of all ages and levels of experience, both in formal classroom settings and through organizations like Project VOICE and InsideOut Literary Arts Project.

Norton, 2020); Brain Fever (WWN, 2014), and Toxic Flora (WWN, 2010), all collections prompted by science; The Narrow Road to the Interior (WWN, 2006), a collection that takes its title from Basho's famous poetic journal; The Unbearable Heart (Kaya, 1996), which received an American Book Award; Earshot (Hanging Loose Press, 1992), which was awarded the Theodore Roethke Memorial Poetry Prize and an Association of Asian American Studies Literature Award.

About the process of writing her most recent book, Foreign Bodies, Hahn reflects in an interview with The Rumpus: "I think things are exotic because they are the Other. Japanese things are not exotic to me but there are other things that are exotic. The insect world, for example. I don't know anything about it, I'm not an entomologist so the language is exotic, and the information has an otherworldly feel. I think there will always be the Other. It's not always positive but it can be. In early childhood development, the mother is the other to the infant, the love object. There will always be the other and I think that's where the exotic resides. Regarding preservation, I'm very interested in it socially. In order to preserve some things we need to move backwards and clean things up. I am literally interested in preservation."

As part of Hahn's service to the CUNY community, she initiated a Chapbook Festival that became an annual event co-sponsored by major literary organizations. Since then, she has added chapbooks to her list of publications: (Write it!): a collection of odes, Brittle Process, Brood, Ragged Evidence, A Field Guide to the Intractable, Boxes with Respect, The Cryptic Chamber, and Resplendent Slug. In 2017, she and Tamiko Beyer collaborated on the chapbook Dovetail.

She takes pleasure in the challenges of collaboration: writing text for film including: Coal Fields, the 1985 experimental documentary by Bill Brand; Ain't Nuthin' but a She Thing a 1995 HBO special; and Everywhere at Once, a 2008 film based on Peter Lindbergh's still photos and narrated by Jeanne Moreau).

Hahn's honors include a Guggenheim Fellowship, PEN/Voelcker Award, Shelley Memorial Prize, a Lila Wallace- Reader's Digest Writers' Award as well as fellowships from the National Endowment for the Arts and the N.Y. Foundation for the Arts. She has taught in graduate programs at the University of Houston and New York University. Hahn has also taught for literary organizations such as the Fine Arts Work Center, Cave Canem, and Kundiman. From 2016-2019, Hahn was President of the Board of Governors, Poetry Society of America. In 2023, she was named a Chancellor for the Academy of American Poets.

She lives in New York where she is a distinguished professor in the MFA Program in Creative Writing & Literary Translation at Queens College, The City University of New York.

Matthew Olzmann is the author of Constellation Route as well as two previous collections of poetry: Mezzanines and Contradictions in the Design. A recipient of fellowships from Kundiman, MacDowell, and the National Endowment for the Arts, Olzmann's poems have appeared in the New York Times, Best American Poetry, The Pushcart Prizes, Kenyon Review, and elsewhere. He is an assistant professor at Dartmouth College and also teaches in the MFA Program for Writers at Warren Wilson College.
